Dear ADDRESSEE,

This summer, July 6-31, 2005, I will be traveling to Ghana, West Africa, on a teaching mission with a group of Charleston Southern University School of Education students. We will spend three weeks teaching in several village schools in Cape Coast, Ghana, and experiencing life in this developing West African country. Our team will devote the next six months to learning about Ghana and preparing lessons to teach to our Ghanaian students. We will also be assembling “educational suitcases” full of school materials to take with us and leave with the teachers to use when we are gone.

We will be participating in Sunday worship services at the Tesano Baptist Church in Accra, Ghana’s capital city, and fellowshiping with the Tesano Baptist Church Youth Group. While in Cape Coast, we will be pursuing Christian ministry and witnessing opportunities with children in the villages where we will be teaching.

The purpose of this letter is to request your support as I prepare for this exciting and unique opportunity. I need people who will pray for me and my fellow team members as we prepare and as we travel to Africa for three intensive weeks next July.

My participation in this program will cost \$4000, which will cover my airfare, in-country transportation, meals, lodging, visa and course tuition. If you would like to participate financially in helping me raise the necessary funds, I would greatly appreciate it. Tax deductible contributions can be made through checks made out to “Charleston Southern University” with my name & *Ghana* in the note line at the bottom of the check. However, if you cannot help financially, I hope you will keep me and my team members in your prayers.

I have included pictures of some of the Ghanaian students with whom we will be working next summer. This program is an international outreach of Charleston Southern University’s School of Education and is partially funded by the university’s Global Education Committee.
