

## **COURSE DESCRIPTIONS FOR SPECIAL/ADVANCED TOPICS SPRING 2010**

**BIOL 480 - 01 PATHOLOGY (3)**. Prerequisites: BIOL 215, BIOL 216 and BIOL 220. Pathology is a study of disease. This is study of the mechanism of disease as well as a systemic overview of the major diseases of each organ system as well as forensic pathology. **Approved for major or minor credit in Biology or general elective. It does not fulfill a LAC requirement.**

**BUSI 651- 40 Human Resources Law and Ethics (3)**. An evaluation of modern legal and regulatory issues facing business leaders in managing their human resources. Topics covered include: employment discrimination, recruitment, drug and polygraph testing, harassment, accommodation of disability, collective bargaining, performance appraisals, privacy concerns, and termination issues. Instruction and discussion will be grounded in a Christian worldview thereby providing students a basis for confidence in reaching decisions within the framework of the rules of law.

**COMM 480 – 01 ACTING FOR THE CAMERA (3)**. Prerequisites: COMM 110 and COMM 321. Acting for the Camera will prepare the student for the specific physical and vocal adjustments required for performance on camera. Students will record and view their performances in each class, thereby improving, through observation and adjustment, their ability to perform on camera. **Approved for major or minor credit in Communication and Theatre (both emphases) or general elective.**

**CRIM 280 – 40 INTRO TO COMPUTER CRIME STUDIES (3)**. Prerequisite: CRIM 210. This online course will entail a study of investigative techniques used in computer crime analysis while surveying the escalating problem of crime involving computers. Topics will include, but not limited to, computing fundamentals and computer history; networking technologies and the Internet; security technologies; initial law enforcement response to cases involving computers; and preventative measures against computer crime and future impacts of computer crime on law enforcement. **CRIM 281- 64 INTRODUCTION TO PRIVATE SECURITY (3)**. Prerequisite: CRIM 210. Examines private security theories, operations, and practices, with an emphasis on the administration and management of security. Explores the philosophical background, history, and current role of private security, as well as the role and status of the security manager in threat assessment, risk prevention, and the protection of assets. Discusses functional area security systems; law, science, and technology for security; and standards, goals, and challenges for the

future. Explores security systems, particularly as they relate to criminal justice and the environment. **Approved for major or minor credit in Criminal Justice or general elective.**

**MLTY 303- 01 AMERICAN MILITARY HISTORY (3).** Examines US Military History from pre-revolutionary times to post-Vietnam: defines the principles of war; discusses political-military interactions; develops leadership through group contribution in case studies and battle analysis.

**POLI 480-01 POLITICAL SCIENCE RESEARCH METHODS (3).** **Prerequisites: POLI 101 or POLI 201.** An introduction to quantitative and qualitative research methods in political science. **Approved for major or minor credit in Political Science or general elective. It does not fulfill a LAC requirement.**

**PSYC 210 – 01 PSYCHOLOGICAL DISORDER IN DEPTH OBSESSIVE COMPLUSIVE DISORDER (1).** **Prerequisite: PSYC 110 .** This course has been designed to provide a comprehensive introduction to Obsessive Compulsive Disorder. Emphasis will be placed on reviewing diagnostic definitions, correlates, epidemiology, etiology, development course, prognosis and treatment. This course is for information purposes and is not designed to address individual needs for counseling. **Approved for major or minor credit in Psychology or general elective.**

**SOCI 282- 62, HIST 282 – 62, RELI 282 – 62 CULTURE AND SOCIETY OF INDIA (2).** **Prerequisties: Approval of the course instructor, successful completion of an application and a 50% airfare deposit due by November 1, 2009, and the balance of the airfare by January 15, 2010.** A two credit hour survey of Indian history and society. The course will cover Indian history with an emphasis since the 19<sup>th</sup> century, religions, government, and social structure. The course will be in preparation to a 2 credit hour in-country experience (Indian Culture and World View Studies) during the Maymester, 2010. **Approved for major or minor credit in Sociology, History, Religion, or general elective. This course may not be challenged.**
